

Director's Notes

Hortensio: Now go thy ways, thou hast tamed a curst shrew. Lucentio: Tis a wonder, by your leave, she will be tamed so.

Act 5 Scene 2

Taming can be understood in different ways; breaking a creature's spirit until it acquiesces, or building a relationship with a creature until it responds voluntarily and two wills are joined in one new rapport. In *The Taming of the Shrew*, as Lucentio notes, the latter is at work. Indeed, in one of the play's most famous monologues, Petruchio compares his relationship to Katherina with that of a falconer to his bird. The sport of falconry involves no leashes, no ties and no damage to the creature, but hinges entirely on the prowess of this deft and dangerous bird of prey being channeled willingly into her relationship with her "master".

Katherina allows herself to be tamed. And who can blame her? At home, Katherina is surrounded by people who fail to see beyond her bad behaviour. She is trapped and suitably enraged by those who insist on adhering to convention. Katherina must be mild and she must be married, as far as they are concerned. Petruchio shares a similar disdain for the status quo but, unlike Katherina, his response is to play the trickster, provoking those around him, challenging their assumptions. In so doing, he renders his world view irresistible. In Petruchio, Katherina finds a mentor in subversion, in spite of herself. By entering into Petruchio's wily and mutable modus operandi, Katherina learns to play her cards close to her chest and to keep those who are not her allies awe-struck, speechless and safely at bay. Katherina becomes deft and inscrutable, and in the end she and Petruchio create a relationship which, while unconventional, is intensely private and enviably passionate.

The Taming of the Shrew is a classic romantic comedy. Two lovers meet and it's hate at first sight. Through a battle of wit and wills, they realize there's more at stake than their pride. They are in love. We know how it will end, but we can't wait to see how it will be accomplished. And like a true romantic comedy, **The Taming of the Shrew** has a happy ending. Katherina faces down a narrow minded community that can't appreciate her strengths and gains a partner who, while lacking in some sensitivities which in today's world we have come to expect, matches her passion, her wit and above all her appetite for challenge. While the terms of their relationship are decidedly from another era in Western history, the spirit of their unique complicity is recognizable across time.


Director Alisa Palmer, costume designer Alison Green and composer John Mills-Cockell are sharing their remarkable

Alisa Palmer Guest Director

Alisa Palmer is an award-winning director and playwright. Most recently she directed the Shaw Festival's summer success **Diana of Dobson's**. Recent projects include the development and premiere of **SIBS** by Diane Flacks and Richard Greenblatt at Toronto's Tarragon Theatre and its subsequent Canadian tour and **SMUDGE** by Alex Bulmer, produced by Nightwood Theatre where she was the Artistic Director from 1994 to 2001. For Nightwood, she directed and collaborated on Ann-Marie MacDonald's award-winning musical **Anything That Moves** at

the DuMaurier World Stage Festival. As a playwright Alisa has received two Chalmers awards for **A Play About the Mothers of Plaza de Mayo** and **i.d.** She directed and co-wrote **The Attic**, **The Pearls & 3 Fine Girls** which is published by Scirroco Press. Alisa has taught at the National Theatre School, University of Waterloo and Ryerson Theatre School. She is delighted to work with the talented students here on the West Coast.



Allan Stichbury Scenic Designer

Allan Stichbury has been a faculty member in the Department of Theatre since 1989 teaching scenic design and lighting design. Recent designs at the Phoenix include set designs for *The Imaginary Invalid, Peer Gynt* and *Endgame*. Allan is also active as a professional designer and his work has been seen at theatres across Canada. Internationally he designed the lighting for *Mr. Lincoln* on Broadway. Recent credits include set and costumes for *Blue/Orange* at the Belfry Theatre and Prairie Theatre Exchange, set and costumes for *Beauty Queen*

of Leenane at Alberta Theatre Projects and set and lighting for **The Mystery of** Edwin Drood at the Shaw Festival. He has exhibited his work, as part of Canada's National Exhibition, at both the 1995 and 1999 Prague Quadrennials and recently returned from the 2003 Quadrennial. He is the Past President of Associated Designers of Canada.



Alison Green Guest Costume Designer

Alison is delighted to be working with the Phoenix team. Her design career began in Montreal where she designed for Radio Canada television. She served as resident designer for the Arts Club Theatre in Vancouver and, over her thirty year relationship with that company, participated in its Granville Island and Stanley Theatre expansions.

Alison joined UBC's Theatre, Film and Creative Writing Department in 1993, where she teaches set and costume design and regularly designs set and costumes for the department's

productions. Recent freelance work includes productions of **Proof** at the Belfry Theatre and **Giulio Cesare** for Pacific Opera Victoria where she has designed six other operas. She has worked for the Vancouver Opera as costume consultant and designer of several touring productions. Alison's designs have received recognition several times by the Jessie Richardson Theatre Awards. She holds a B.F.A. and an M.F.A. degree from U.B.C., and is a member of the Associated Designers of Canada.

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William Mackwood Lighting Designer

William Mackwood graduated from the University of Victoria's theatre program with a specialization in Directing, and a focus on Drama-in-Education. Since then, he has gradually become more involved in the world of design. His lighting designs include Opera Studio's productions of **Eyes on the Mountain**, **Opera X posed**, **¡Ay, Amor!** and **Romeo and Juliet**. Last year he designed lights for the Phoenix Theatre's production of **The Imaginary Invalid** and projections for **Rappaccini's Daughter**. Currently, he is in his second year of the Master's

Program in Design at the University of Victoria. William loves all things theatre related.



John Mills-Cockell Sound Designer

John Mills-Cockell has created over 100 scores for film, television and radio and has a discography of 10 recordings. Credits include sound design for *King Lear* produced by John Juliani for CBC Radio as well as productions for the National Arts Centre, Vancouver Playhouse, Richmond's Gateway Theatre, Royal Winnipeg Ballet and National Ballet of Canada. For the Phoenix, he designed the sound for *Peer Gynt*. John won the SOCAN a ward for outstanding contribution to Canadian film and the Canadian Film and Television Award for

best original score for **The Newcomers**. Recently, John was commissioned by Monart Pon to compose **Concerto of Deliverance** which will premiere this winter in Calgary.



Michael Gormley, Director

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
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Britt Candide Small Assistant Director

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
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
