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Note from the Director



When I was asked to direct Rachel Wyatt's play *Crackpot*, I trudged through the snow to the library (I was in Regina) to find a copy. I couldn't devour the play fast enough. I was intrigued, delighted, shocked and moved.

Crackpot's protagonist, Hoda, is a wise cracking, naïve, bawdy character. After the death of her Mother she does what she must to stay with her blind father and preserve her family. Her methods are unorthodox, to say the least, but she is a survivor and for this I applaud her. She captivated me with her humour and her lust for life.

In setting and costuming the play I wanted to bring you a heightened look at Hoda's world, a world that spans a thirty-three year period from 1912 – 1945 in the north end of Winnipeg. For influences, designers Laurin Kelsey, Sabrina Miller and I looked to artists Chagall and L.L. Fitzgerald and researched the Yiddish Theatre of the early 1900's.

The play is set against a backdrop of historical events, World War I, the Winnipeg General Strike of 1919, the Royal Visit, the Depression of the 1930's and finally World War II. Although many of these events are sombre, Hoda, our larger than life heroine, shows us the heart and the humour.

Crackpot speaks to me about family, mothering, community, survival, hope and love. I hope it speaks to you as well.

I would like to dedicate my work on this play to my mother Ona McDermott (May 1920 - February 2007).

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About the Playwright





Rachel Wyatt emigrated to Canada from England with her husband and children in 1957. She is the author of five novels and four collections of stories. She has written uncountable radio dramas for the CBC and the BBC. Her stage plays have been produced across the country, in the United States and in the UK. Her most recent collection of short fiction is *The Magician's Beautiful Assistant*, published by Hedgerow Press. For many years she was Director of Writing at The Banff Centre. She is a member of

the Order of Canada and a recipient of the Queen's Jubilee Medal.

Note from the Playwright

Writing this play was both a joy and a sorrow. A sorrow because I was adapting the novel for radio and stage as a memorial to its author. But it was a joy and a challenge to give the various characters in this wonderful book another life. Sadly there were some who had to be left out if the play was not to be five hours long, and now and then I sense them lurking backstage waiting for their cues. This is the ninth production of *Crackpot* and I'm delighted that it is now being put on here at the Phoenix. Wherever she has gone, Hoda, the heroine has won friends through her courage and her generosity—qualities that belonged also to her creator, my late friend, Adele Wiseman.







Fran Gebhard Director

Fran is thrilled to be back at the University of Victoria directing and teaching. She spent last year at the University of Regina where she taught all levels of acting and directed *The School for Scandal*. Other directing credits include *Twelfth Night, The Shadow Box, As You Like It, The Affections of May, A Midsummer Night's Dream, For The Pleasure of Seeing Her Again*, and *Les Liaisons Dangereuses*. Fran received her MFA in Directing at UBC.

Last seen at the Phoenix as Martha in *Amigo's Blue Guitar*, Fran has worked in theatres across Canada. Favourite credits include Lady Wishfort in *Way of the World*, Lycus in *A Funny Thing Happened On The Way To The Forum*, Brutus in *Julius Caesar*, and Mary in *Kilt*. She also does regular performances of her one-woman show *Looking For Kitty*.

Film and television credits include *Blue City Slammers* (for which she received a Genie nomination), *The Chris Issak Show, Just Deal, Ernest Goes to School, Shame, Police Academy, Common Ground* and *Moment of Truth*, Stephen Kings' *Dead Zone, Taken* and the soon to be released *Case No. 39* with Renee Zellweger. Fran was also a series regular on *A Nice Show* for CBC.

Fran has had a varied career in the theatre. In addition to acting and directing she hosted her own radio show, *Fran's Culture Showcase*. She enjoys working as a dramaturge and is a former program head of the Banff playRites Colony. She is looking forward to adjudicating two play festivals this Summer for Theatre BC.



Laurin Kelsey Set Designer

Crackpot is Laurin's first project working as a Set Designer but also her final project before graduating from the department this April. Recent work on main-stage productions includes Richard III (Asst. Set Designer and Scenic Painter), Tartuffe (Asst. Set Designer and Scenic Painter), Tyrants (Scenic Painter), Metamorphoses (Asst. Costume Designer) and Guys & Dolls (Props Asst.). Laurin is a winner of the 2006 President Award at UVic for academic excellence as well as the I.O.D.E's Provincial Arts Award.

She has also had film experience working in the Art Department on the set of the television series *Stargate SG-1*.



Sabrina Miller Costume Designer

Sabrina started designing costumes and sets as a hobby while she pursued her career as a palaeontologist. Her enjoyment of the art of design led her away from dinosaurs to the Department of Theatre's Design specialization, in which she is in her third year. Previous designs include *Tartuffe* (Phoenix Theatre), *Charlotte's Web* (Kaleidoscope), *Macbeth* (Victoria Shakespeare Society), *Little Women* (Kaleidoscope), *Beanstalk* (Four Seasons), *Forever Plaid* (Oak Bay Beach Hotel) and *Fiddler on the Roof* (VOS).





Michael Franzmann Lighting Designer

Michael has previously designed lights for SATCo (Student Alternative Theatre Company), Four Seasons, The Gilbert and Sullivan Society and sound design for Victoria Operatic Society. An active member within the department, Michael has been involved in nearly every Phoenix main-stage since he started in 2004 and he serves as an executive member on the Theatre Course Union, Technical Director for SATCo and Student Senator for the Faculty of Fine Arts. After spending the past summer as a lighting work-study at the Banff Centre,

Michael looks forward to traveling to Thailand next year where he will study design at Chulalongkorn University.



Amy Kirkpatrick Sound Designer

Amy is a fourth year student at the department working on her first main-stage sound design. In the past four years, she has worked on several Phoenix productions, including lighting board operator for *Amigo's Blue Guitar, That Elusive Spark* and *Guys and Dolls*. This year Amy was the electrician on both *Tartuffe* and *Richard III*. *Crackpot* will be her last project at the Phoenix Theatre and she will be continuing a career in music after graduation.



Lisi Tessler Dialect Coach/Nurse/Mother

A second year student at the Department of Theatre, *Crackpot* is Lisi's first main-stage production at the Phoenix. Past credits include *Macbeth* (Victoria Shakespeare Society), *The Caucasian Chalk Circle* (Tarragon Theatre Arts Fair), and her self-written play *The Interview*, which she directed and acted in at the Sears Ontario Drama Festival.



Tanya Gadsby Stage Manager

Tanya is a fourth year theatre student and *Crackpot* is her first show as stage manager. She previously worked as an assistant stage manager for *Metamorphoses* and *That Elusive Spark* and performed as the Maid in *Rodeo Star*. Tanya also wrote *Flealess* which recently debuted in the 2007 FIND Studio Series. This past summer Tanya worked as a production assistant for the first Yukon International Film Festival in her hometown of Whitehorse, Yukon. This past fall she acted in a short film for Bravo!FACT that was shot in the Yukon. Tanya hopes to pursue playwriting, acting, design and stage management.



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
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Phoenix Phacts

Ryan Haché Soldier


Ryan is a second year acting student at the Department of Theatre. *Crackpot* is his Phoenix main-stage debut.




Laura Harris Miss Botholmsup
