


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Pia Wyatt Director

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Michel Tremblay Playwright

Johnny Mangano & His Astonishing Dogs and Gloria Star




Michel Tremblay was born June 25, 1942, in the industrial East End of Montreal. While still in high school, he began writing poems, plays and novels. At 18, after completing the eleventh grade, he enrolled in the Graphic Arts Institute of Quebec, where he learned the trade of linotypist. It was at that time that he began writing the short stories which were later published as *Stories for Late Night Drinkers*.

From 1963 to 1966 he worked as a linotypist. In 1964 he won first prize in a competition for young writers,

sponsored by the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation, for his play *Le Train* which he wrote in 1959.

In 1965, Michel Tremblay wrote Les Belles Soeurs, which was first produced at the Theatre du Rideau Vert, in Montreal. It was immediately acclaimed by critics and public alike and has since been performed in many countries. Many of Tremblay's plays have been well received abroad. Productions of Bonjour la, Bonjour have been mounted in New York and Tokyo, Les Belles Soeurs in Chicago and Glasgow in 1989, and Hosanna in Paris. His plays have been performed throughout Canada and the United States, as well as in England, France, Germany, Scotland, Belgium Finland, Poland, Australia, Holland, Italy, Sweden, Venezuela, Brazil, Romania and Japan. All of his plays, three novels, and one collection of tales have been published in English translation, and some of his work has been published in France, England and Germany as well. A prolific writer, Tremblay's work now includes twenty-one plays, three musical comedies, eleven novels, three collections of tales, two collections of short stories and seven film scripts. He has translated and adapted a total of fourteen plays by Aristophanes, Paul Zindel, Tennessee Williams, Dario Fo, Chekhov, and Gogol. He has also written lyrics for songs interpreted by some of Quebec's best-known singers, and in 1989 he wrote the libretto for an opera, Nelligan, which was produced by the Montreal Opera Company in February 1990. His play, For The Pleasure of Seeing Her Again, was produced by the Belfry Theatre last season.

For the originality of his style, the broad range of expression, and his profound vision of the world in which we live, Michel Tremblay is undoubtedly one of the most significant writers of our times.



Daniel Maclvor *Playwright*

This is a Play



Daniel Maclvor was born in Sydney, Cape Breton in 1962. He studied theatre at Dalhousie University in Halifax and George Brown College in Toronto. He is an actor, director, producer, writer and artistic director.

His other plays include Somewhere I Have Never Traveled, Yes I Am and Who Are You!, See Bob Run, Wild Abandon, Never Swim Alone, Jump, 2-2 Tango, and The Soldier Dreams. With Daniel Brooks he co-wrote House, Here Lies

Henry, and Monster. MacIvor has been nominated six times for the Chalmers New Canadian Play Award; in 1998 for See Bob Run; in 1990 for the collective creation White Trash, Blue Eyes; and in 1991 for Never Swim Alone, 2-2 Tango. House won the Chalmers Award in 1991, as did Here Lies Henry, which was also the Fringe First at the 1996 Edinburgh Fringe Festival. As a film and video maker, his projects include: The Fairy Who Didn't Want to be a Fairy Anymore (with Laurie Lynd), Parade (with Brad Fraser), Permission and Until I Hear From You (with Da Da Kamera). In 1995, House was made into a feature film by Laurie Lynd. Marion Bridge is MacIvor's latest book, published by Talonbooks in March of 1999. Marion Bridge was nominated for the 1999 Governor General's Award for Drama.



Patrick du Wors Set Designer



Patrick is thrilled to have been given the opportunity to create the set design for this Phoenix main stage production. Patrick is in his third year at the University of Victoria studying both set and costume design. He graduated high school in Saskatoon where he spent a great deal of time concentrating on both graphic art and theatre. He spent the year following graduation as a Rotary Youth Exchange Student in France. He has directed/produced Arthur Kopit's *Sing To Me Through Open Window* at the 1997 Saskatoon Fringe Festival and the collective creation

Fool House for last year's SATCO (Student Alternative Theatre Co.) season. Patrick is also a current member of the SATCO Board of Directors. He is very grateful for the immeasurable support provided by Professors Allan Stichbury and Mary Kerr as well as the entire production team at the Phoenix. Furthermore, he has found working with the fabulously energetic Pia Wyatt (Director) and the all-student design team thoroughly rewarding. Patrick is looking forward to next year's exciting season at UVic.

Kris Johnston *Costume Designer* Johnny Mangano & Gloria Star



Kris Johnston is a graduating student bent on furthering a career in the multifaceted world of a director/designer. This is his first mainstage show at The Phoenix. He has dedicated his five years to play building works such as *Tides* and *Impetus*. He enlisted the help of local artists, designers, musicians and technical wizards to create fully collaborative pieces celebrating the exploration process of theatrical art. These pieces were co-written and produced with friend and colleague Tim Fukushima, under the tutelage of acclaimed designer Mary Kerr. He has also designed sets for Lawrence

Phillips' version of Brad Fraser's *Poor Superman* at the Firehall Theatre in Vancouver and *Fool House* directed by Liz Dent and Patrick du Wors here at the Phoenix. His passions are deep seeded in the infinite possibility of The Theatrical universe finding inspiration in the people who choose to aid him in the building of a dream.

Heather Libby Costume Designer This is a Play



A platinum blonde playwright, designer, historian and general merrymaker, Heather never shies away from a challenge. Some of her previous achievements in theatre include: Costume design for *Poor Superman* at the Firehall Arts Centre (which featured Kris Johnston as Set Designer); playwright of *A Generic Party* (with Peggy Gordon), *It was a Glandular Condition, Really*!, and the forthcoming *E.T. The Musical* for SATCo. This year Heather assisted Phoenix Alumnus, Susie Edwards, on Kaleidoscope Theatre's

production of *City* and organized *Fringe Kids 2000* as part of The Victoria Fringe Festival. During her free time, Heather can be found singing 80's kareoke, bonding with her cats or writing for Campus Comedy newspaper, The BaG. Soon to be armed with a trusty B.A. Honours in Theatre History, Heather convocates in the Spring of 2001 and is coming soon to a graduate school near you.

Karen Goddard Lighting Designer



This is Karen's first full mainstage design at The Phoenix, though previous credits include Lighting Designer for the ABCDE Drama Festival (hosted by the Phoenix) and Assistant Lighting Designer for *Colours in the Storm*. She has also acted as assistant lighting designer on several productions including *Sylvia* for The Belfry Theatre, *Madama Butterfly* for Pacific Opera Victoria and *The Glace Bay Miners' Museum* for The Phoenix. Karen is also actively pursuing theatre sound as a career and has spent the past two summers as an audio intern at the Banff Centre For the Arts



Jay's next project is the role of "The Mayor" in the Phoenix production *Two Planks and a Passion*. Jay has recently been seen in *Frogs*, Island Repertory Company's *Hard Hearts*, Langham Court's *Noises*

Off, and the Victoria Symphony's version of Hamlet.
