Notes from the Director: Treking the Epic



A student in tonight's production of *Othello* reminded me recently of how long we have been working on this play. It has been seeping into our collective imaginations and dreams for nearly 12 months, but it is only recently that we have truly awoken to the size of the epic challenge Shakespeare has presented us. Cram-packed with the conflicts surrounding issues such as race, gender, diversity and identity, the reasons *Othello* seems as fresh today as when it premiered more than 400 years ago is because of the depth of intellect that Shakespeare brought to these tragically timeless issues. And, as you will no doubt notice, it's long.

Shakespeare's sixth-longest play, the mere length of it makes it a huge challenge for student or professional interpreters.

My reading of Shakespeare supports the notion that he was a champion of the "other" throughout his career. But in *Othello* he does not let us fall into the comfort of an easy analysis of this sad aspect of the human experience. Rather, he suggests that the notion of the "other" resides within ourselves as well as in how others look at us. It is this that makes this play one of his greatest tragedies. Throwing off the easy moralizations found in earlier dramatists, Shakespeare paints a portrait of humanity as he saw it — full of beauty and ugliness in (almost) equal measure.

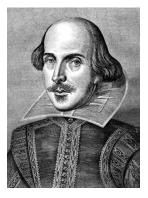
So back to dreaming. After many nights of grappling with this play, I have awoken in an uneasy sweat — worried about how we might match, if not the skill, then the courage of Shakespeare's remarkable invention. But then I walk into the rehearsal hall and I see all the young people who have committed to this epic journey on a night-by-night basis. And I think to myself. "Hey Will...we may not make it to the finish line like you did but we're sure going to try. And the reason we will give it all our effort is because the issues you present in your remarkable work are just too important for us not to."

My thanks to all the many wonderfully talented collaborators on stage and off who have contributed their minds, hearts, bodies and souls to this journey. This is the human experience Shakespeare spoke to and I feel so privileged to have been invited along on the trek.

About the Playwright



William Shakespeare's collection of work includes 38 plays, two narrative poems, 154 sonnets, and a variety of other poems. No original manuscripts of Shakespeare's plays are known to exist, however a group of actors from Shakespeare's company collected 36 scripts after Shakespeare died. They were brought together in what is known as the *First Folio*. Later, his plays, sonnets, and poems were compiled in various iterations of *The Complete Works of William Shakespeare*. His legacy is as rich and diverse as his work, which has spawned countless adaptations across multiple genres and cultures, as well as an enduring presence in film. Over 400 years later, William Shakespeare continues to be one of the most important literary figures of the English language.

Cover Credit:

The portrait on the cover is that of Ira Aldridge, the first black man to perform a Shakespearean role in Britain and to play the role of Othello. The cover is based on the portrait that was painted by James Northcote in 1826. Despite facing much racial discrimination, Aldridge became one of the most successful actors in the 19th century.



Creative Team



Brian Richmond, Director

Brian is a multi-award-winning director of nearly 150 productions for major and smaller theatres across Canada, the US, Mexico and Europe. At the Phoenix, he has directed **The Threepenny Opera, Romeo and** Juliet, Dark of the Moon, Wind in the Willows, Tyrants, Guys and Dolls, He Who Gets Slapped, The Fever, The Resistible Rise of Arturo Ui, Peer Gynt and Frogs. As a dramaturge, he has worked with many of Canada's leading playwrights including Ken Mitchell, George Ryga, Dennis Foon, Paul Ledoux, David Young, Tomson Highway, Allan Stratton, Michel Marc Bouchard, Sally Clark, Sharon Pollock, Drew Hayden Taylor, Jennifer Wise, and his son, Jacob Richmond, among many others. The Founding Artistic Director of Saskatoon's Persephone Theatre, he has also served in this role for Thunder Bay's Magnus Theatre, Montreal's Playwright's Workshop, Toronto's Theatre Passe-Muraille and Victoria's Blue Bridge Repertory Theatre — which he founded in 2009. A former Chair of the Department of Theatre at UVic (2001–08), Professor Richmond currently offers courses in directing, acting and text analysis.



Jacques Lemay, Choreographer/Fight Director

Jacques has directed and choreographed hundreds of theatre and opera productions across Canada, as well as film and television. He is the former Artistic Director of the Charlottetown Festival and Founding Director of the Jazz Dance department for the Royal Winnipeg Ballet (RWB). He gained renown as a choreographer for the RWB and other international dance companies. He was the Artistic Director and Senior Choreographer of the Calgary Olympics Opening Ceremonies; Producer/Artistic Director of the 1994 Victoria Commonwealth Games, Special Olympics World Winter Games, Canada Summer and Winter Games, Opening Ceremonies of Confederation Bridge; Creative Advisor for the Vancouver Olympics Opening and Closing Ceremonies; and Artistic Director of six royal visits. He has been retained by the Canada Council for the Arts as well as provincial and territorial arts councils. Mr. Lemay co-founded the Canadian College of Performing Arts.



Conor Farrell, Set Co-Designer

Conor is in his fifth year of his BFA, specializing in Theatrical Design, with plans of starting a Master's Degree in the near future. Recently he worked to adapt Ken MacDonald's original set design for Morris Panych's **7 Stories** for the Phoenix's Roger Bishop stage. He is glad to have had the opportunity to work with friend and colleague Logan Swain on their set co-design for this production. He was a professional actor for 14 years before becoming a voice and speech trainer. Prior to joining the Department of Theatre, he taught at a variety of institutions including the Royal Central School of Speech & Drama, GSMD, and Shakespeare's Globe Theatre.
