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Notes from the Director:



Like many other of Alan Ayckbourn's works, **Comic Potential** is both finely crafted and very funny. While it dates back to 1998, its exploration of artificial intelligence in our lives has acquired topical value. More than ever in our world, A.I. is a looming force that some, including Elon Musk and the late Stephen Hawking, have warned is a very dangerous thing indeed for the human race. (I think the climate crisis will get us before our robots do, but let that pass...)

To imagine a world where at least some human actors have been replaced by robots is both a hilarious send-up of the way actors are

perceived, and also an intriguing proposition: if all actors do is to reproduce behaviour, why not invent human-like equivalents to do so with programmable precision and predictability? This proposition is complicated by the fact that they work both better and worse than humans. They frequently have hilarious glitches, but it's the malfunction of one of them that makes her both more interesting as an actor—having a sense of humour allows her to offer something original to performance—and who seems to be able to engage in a fully human relationship, at least at the emotional level. In exploring these possibilities the play therefore becomes a meditation on what makes us human: are we nothing more than the sum total of the "life-scripts" we have absorbed, and that we sometimes reproduce automatically, outside of our conscious control? Is there such a thing as the 'self'? Could we someday fully and accurately reproduce ourselves via technological processes rather than by the usual method? In pointing at such weighty questions the play seems to make oblique reference to **Pygmalion**, and also to Mary Shelley's masterpiece **Frankenstein**.

A big thank you to the wonderful cast of this show, as well as the creative and production teams. In the course of rehearsing this piece we were all reminded at various times that theatre is created by means of the very *human* capacity for collaboration.

About the Playwright



Ayckbourn has worked in theatre as a playwright and director for over 60 years. To date he has written more than 80 plays, various one-act plays, and many works for younger audiences. His plays have been translated into over 35 languages and are performed on stage and television throughout the world, winning countless awards. His major successes include: *Relatively Speaking, How the Other Half Loves, Absurd Person Singular, Bedroom Farce, A Chorus of Disapproval*, and *The Norman Conquests*.

In recent years, he received the 2010 Critics' Circle Award for Services to the Arts and the 2016 Oxford Literary Festival's Honorary Fellowship, and was inducted into the American Theatre's Hall of Fame. He is the first British playwright to receive both Olivier and Tony Special Lifetime Achievement Awards, and was knighted in 1997 for services to the theatre. 2019 marked both his 80th birthday and the 60th anniversary of his professional playwriting debut.

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Creative Team



Conrad Alexandrowicz, Director

Conrad holds a BFA in Dance (York) and an MFA in Directing (U of A). Over a decades-long career in performance he migrated from dance to theatre, and has been a dancer, choreographer, writer of texts for dance, playwright, actor and director. For many years he was the artistic director of Wild Excursions Performance, the company he founded to present his work. To date he has created over 50 dance- and physical-theatre works, some of which have been presented across Canada, in New York, France and the U.K. An associate professor in the Department of Theatre, he specializes in movement for actors and physical theatre creation. His writing has been published in *Theatre, Dance and Performance Training,* the *Canadian Journal for Practice-Based Research in Theatre*, and *Studies in Theatre and Performance*. His first book, *Acting Queer: Gender Dissidence and the Subversion of Realism,* has just been published by Palgrave Macmillan. He is currently developing a co-edited collection of essays and other interventions on the topic of reimagining theatre education in response to the climate crisis.
