






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

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Director's Notes



Playwright Sarah Ruhl lost her father to cancer at the age of twenty and much of her early writing is dedicated to mourning and coming to terms with his death. Eurydice is very much the story of Sarah and her father. Told through the lens of myth and imagination, the play is not a realistic exploration of this story, but rather an expression of the complexity of Ruhl's emotional journey. Entering the world of Sarah Ruhl is like stepping into a

dream where time is suspended and reality melds with the magical and whimsical mind of the dreamer. This is why I find this play so mesmerizing; it challenges us to peer through the veil of death and see the far-reaching consequences of our actions.

When starting on this project, I felt I needed to re-imagine and create a version of the play that was unique to the George theatre. I wanted not only to explore the potential of the space but also the theories of great theatre practitioners of today and yesterday. Designer Mary Kerr was the perfect person with which to embark on the journey of asking "what is it?" rather than saying "this is it". Together we have created a bold, kinetic world that awakens imagination and breathes life into Ruhl's poetic language and odd characters.

I want to extend my sincere gratitude to Linda Hardy and all the artists and technicians who've worked on making this dream a reality at UVic.

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Playwright's Bio



Sarah Ruhl was born in Wilmette, Illinois in 1973, where her father instilled in her a love of music and a fascination with language. She initially aspired to specialize in poetry while studying at Brown University. However, her father's untimely death instead inspired her first play, *The Dog Play*. She earned a BA in 1997 and an MFA in 2001. *Eurydice* was written in 2003 and saw productions at Circle X Theatre, Georgetown University, Berkeley and Yale before

making it to New York's Second Stage Theatre in 2007. While *Eurydice* was making this journey, Ruhl found success with shows such as *Melancholy Play*, *Virtual Meditation #1*, and *Passion Play: a Cycle*, which won the Pen American Award and the Fourth Freedom Forum Playwriting Award from The Kennedy Center. *The Clean House* (2004) won the Susan Smith Blackburn Prize and was a Pulitzer Prize finalist. In 2006 she received a MacArthur Fellowship "genius grant" for "creating vivid and adventurous theatrical works that poignantly juxtapose the mundane aspects of daily life with mythic themes of love and war." More recently, her play *Dead Man's Cell Phone* (2008) explored the personal disconnection that stems from the progression of modern technology, and *In the Next Room (or The Vibrator Play)* (2009) examined the early history of the vibrator and its use as a clinical device for the treatment of "hysteria." *In the Next Room* was Ruhl's Broadway debut and earned three Tony Award nominations, including Best Play. It was also her second play to be named a finalist for the Pulitzer Prize in Drama. Her newest play, *Stage Kiss*, debuted in Chicago in May of 2011.

Jeffrey Pufahl Director

Jeffrey is excited to be finishing up his MFA in Directing at UVic with this stunning piece of theatre. Last season at the Phoenix, he was the Assistant Director/Music Director for Yerma and Twelfth Night. His work as a theatre artist has been seen across Canada, the US and Europe. He directed numerous productions for The Souris Valley Theatre and Regina Lyric Light Opera and was the Artistic Director of BSide Productions for five years. He was the Associate Director/Production Manager for the Armonico Consort's highly acclaimed opera production of Purcell's The Fairy Queen, which toured the UK. Jeff has also written and directed three documentary films for the award winning series *Landing: Stories from the Cultural Divide*. As an actor/singer, Jeff has performed with Chemainus Theatre Festival (*Fiddler on* the Roof), Persephone Theatre, Shakespeare on the Saskatchewan, Globe Theatre, The Cincinnati Symphony Orchestra, Regina Symphony Orchestra, Infinit Theatre – Montreal, The Charlottetown Festival, and Off Broadway in Caligula - An Ancient Glam Epic - which won the Audience Choice Award at the New York Musical Theatre Festival in 2004. Jeff has written, produced and performed in two International Fringe Festival hits: Prairie Salt and Caberlesque! (Best Musical, Victoria Fringe), and toured Canada with Pau Miro's It's Raining in Barcelona. He holds his Bachelor of Music in voice from McGill University and an MFA in performance from the Cincinnati Conservatory of Music. Mary Kerr Production Designer

Mary Kerr has a distinguished career as a leading production designer in theatre, dance, opera, television, exhibition and special events design. Her award-winning, artistically unique sets and costumes have been seen at the Shaw Festival, Stratford Festival, The National Arts Centre, The National Ballet of Canada, The Royal Winnipeg Ballet, The Danny Grossman Dance Company, The Canadian Opera Company, and most major regional theatres. Her work has been showcased internationally in New York, London, New Zealand, the Paris Opera, the CBC, the 1994 Commonwealth Games Opening and Closing Ceremonies and the award-winning PBS children's television show, *The Toy Castle*. She has represented Canada at international competitions such as World Stage Design 2005 and 2009 and The Prague Quadrennial Design Competitions. Recent work includes Sweeney Todd at the Citadel Theatre and Bella: The Colour of Love, a new musical she designed and co-wrote for the Philadelphia Theatre Company and Philadelphia Museum of Art in 2011 about Marc Chagall's wife Bella. Mary was elected a Fellow of the Royal Society of Canada in 2010 and received an Honorary Doctorate in 2011 from the University of Manitoba. Mary is Canadian Research Editor for World Scenography Vol.1 and 2 and has designed numerous productions at the UVic theatre department including Arturo Ui and The Wind in The Willows.

Bryan Kenney Lighting Designer

Bryan received his BA in Technical Scenography from Dalhousie University in Halifax. This is his second year in the MFA Theatre Design program at UVic. 
Derek Wallis Orpheus

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Phoenix Phacts

Phoenix Theatre productions, alumni and faculty were well represented in the 2011 Critics' Choice Spotlight Awards. Critics from the *Times Colonist*, CBC Radio, and *Culture Vulture* Victoria chose the awards for the 10th annual contest. The "Best New Play" award went to *Inside*, which had its world premiere at the Phoenix in March of 2011. Acclaimed Canadian writer **Daniel MacIvor** was in residence during the production process, and tailored the script to the student actors involved. "Best Community Production" was also awarded to a Phoenix show: the groovy, 1960's rendition of Shakespeare's *Twelfth Night* directed by professor **Linda Hardy**.

"Best Performance in a Community Production" went to alumnus and theatre instructor **Clayton Jevne** (BFA '85, MFA '88, PhD '03) for his work in **Moscow Stations**. **Ride the Cyclone**, directed by past theatre student **Jacob Richmond** and alumna **Britt Small** (BFA '98 MFA '04) starring alumni **Rielle Braid** (BFA '09), **Matthew Coulson** (BFA '10), **Kholby Wardell** (BFA '08) and **Sarah Jane Pelzer** (BFA '09), won "Best Musical Production." Finally, "Best Professional Production" went to Blue Bridge Repertory Theatre's **Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf**, which featured graduates **Alex Plouffe** (BFA '11) and **Celine Stubel** (BFA '02), and was directed by professor **Brian Richmond** (who also won for "Best Direction.") Congratulations to all the winners!

Kitt and Jane, the newest creation from SNAFU Dance Theatre, founded by alumni Ingrid Hansen (BFA '09), Victor Dolhai (BFA '07) and Sarah Jane Pelzer (BFA '09) in 2006 for a Student Alternative Theatre Company production, will be premiering at the Belfry Theatre this March. The production was selected for the Belfry Theatre's Incubator Project, which offers independent theatre companies mentorship and performance opportunities, culminating in a spot in their SPARK Festival. Kitt and Jane, created by Hansen and former Phoenix student Kathleen Greenfield, is the follow-up to their 2011 Fringe hit Little Orange Man. Theatre graduate Amitai Marmorstein (BFA '07) was recently seen on the big screen at the Victoria International Film Festival, starring in the independent comedic mockumentary Sunflower Hour. Amitai plays David, a sweet and tormented amateur puppeteer who hopes to go professional. Other recent parts for Amitai have included roles in Donovan's Echo, a science-fiction thriller, and the Golden Globe-nominated 50/50.

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The Original Greek Myth of Orpheus and Eurydice


Sarah Ruhl's play Eurydice is a contemporary retelling of the ancient Greek myth that focuses on the hero Orpheus in his guest to save his love Eurydice from the underworld. Orpheus was a legendary musician, poet, and prophet, whom Apollo taught to play the lyre. The ancient Greek poet Pindar referred to Orpheus as the "Father of Songs" with music that was said to charm living things, rocksand trees. In the original myth, Eurydice (sometimes referred to as Euridice and also known as Agriope) is walking among her people in some tall grass at her wedding when she falls into a nest of vipers (sometimes told as serpents) and is bitten on her heel. The poison shoots into her body and kills her instantly. Orpheus discovers her body and, overcome with grief, plays such sad and mournful songs that all the nymphs and gods wept. On their advice, Orpheus travels to the underworld and by his music, softens the hearts of Hades and Persephone who agree to allow Eurydice to return with him to earth. There is one condition: he must walk in front of her and not look back until they both had reached the upper world. Setting off with Eurydice following, Orpheus, in his anxiety, turns to look at her as he reaches the upper world but before Eurydice is at the threshold. She vanishes for the forever and he has lost her for a second time.

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
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
