About T. S. Eliot

Thomas Stearns Eliot was an American-English poet, playwright, literary critic, and editor. He was a leader of the Modernist movement in poetry. He articulated distinctly modern themes as one of the most daring innovators of 20th-century poetry, revitalizing English poetry and creating new conventions through his experiments in writing. Eliot held the strong belief that poetry should aim at a representation of the complexities of modern civilization in language and that such representation necessarily leads to difficult poetry. His works always inclined toward the theatrical. His early poems are essentially dramatic, and many of his early essays and reviews are on drama or dramatists. In 1948 he was awarded both the Order of Merit and the Nobel Prize for Literature.

We acknowledge and respect the Lekwungen peoples on whose traditional territory the University of Victoria stands, and the Songhees, Esquimalt and <u>W</u>SÁNEĆ peoples whose historical relationships with the land continue to this day.

Notes from the Director/Choreographer

In March 2011, I was awarded a substantial grant from the Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council to explore the staging of poetry with actors, dancers and musicians. The project proceeded from the proposition that some poetry—perhaps all of it—seeks to retrace the path it has taken from its pre-literate past, when it was sung and spoken; that poetic text for the page might find an amplified set of meanings when embodied by performers working across the disciplines of theatre and dance. The project made sense, given the decades I spent staging my own poetic texts with dancers and/or actors, combining elements of dance and theatre in various ways and proportions. And so it seemed logical for me to present a work of this kind as part of mainstage season, a move the like of which has never—to my knowledge—been made before.

But why choose *The Waste Land*, T.S. Eliot's iconic work of literary modernism? I must credit Prof. Brian Richmond with the suggestion that it might be an appropriate challenge for me. There is symbolic value in staging the work this year, the poem's centenary, but many other, better reasons: it emerged in a time of chaos and uncertainty not unlike our own, and represents a search for meaning in the midst of terrible darkness.

I revisited the work, and immediately began to see how parts of it might be staged—not only the two passages that are constituted as scenes ("My nerves are bad tonight…" and "When Lil's husband got demobbed…"). I noted places where the narrative voice of the poem shifted, suggesting a variety of speakers. The poem is loaded with allusions to a vast range of other texts, and it made sense in some cases to stage these as well as Eliot's own lines. But the most significant intervention on my part was to reveal the significant gay subtext in the work: many critics have suggested that the poem was imagined and written in memory of Jean Verdenal, the French medical student who became Eliot's close friend when they shared a rooming-house in Paris, and who was killed at the age of twenty-six in the disastrous battle of Gallipoli in 1915.

Conrad Alexandrowicz Director/Choreographer

Conrad, MFA, is an associate professor in the Department of Theatre at the University of Victoria, where he teaches movement and physical theatre creation for actors, and directs department productions. Over a decades-long career in performance he migrated from dance to theatre, and has been a dancer, dance critic, choreographer, writer of texts for dance, playwright, actor, director and producer. He has created over fifty dance and physical theatre works, many of which were presented across Canada, and internationally, mainly under the producing auspices of the company he founded, Wild Excursions Performance. His writing has been published in *Theatre, Dance and Performance Training, Studies in Theatre and Performance*, and *Theatre Topics*. His first book, *Acting Queer: Gender Dissidence and the Subversion of Realism*, was published by Palgrave in February 2020. He is currently committed to exploring the possibilities for transformation of theatre education in response to the climate crisis. The coedited collection that he instigated, and to which he contributed, entitled *Theatre Pedagogy in the Era of Climate Crisis*, was published by Routledge in May 2021.

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
