### Welcome to the 2004 - 2005 season of the Phoenix Theatre.

As one of Canada's premier theatre training institutes, every year the faculty, staff and students in the University of Victoria's Department of Theatre endeavour to choose a season of plays that can create a marriage between:

Our goal of providing exciting training opportunities for our acting, directing, writing, design, history and production students; and, Our desire to entertain you, our loyal supporters.

This year, we believe we have outdone ourselves in meeting these objectives!

First up we will be providing our own form of 'Welcome Wagon' to one of Canada's finest living playwrights, Joan MacLeod. Tonight you will experience her electrically charged 1990's political drama *Amigo's Blue Guitar*. Next spring she will also work with young playwrights from the Department of Writing in our Festival of Innovative and New Drama's Studio Series.

Next we present our production of (what many consider) America's greatest musical, *Guys and Dolls*, featuring an outstanding creative team (including Music Director Don Horsburgh, Choreographer Gwen Dobie, Set and Costume Designer Ed Kotanen and Lighting Designer Michael Whitfield). The thrill of hearing our students sing the wonderful tunes of Frank Loesser already has our department abuzz with excitement.

January brings the premiere of a new work, *Hippies and Bolsheviks*, from one of Victoria's most exciting young troupes - Theatre SKAM (comprised mainly of UVic grads).

Then our MFA Directing candidate, Yasmine Kandil (all the way from Egypt!) will present her first directing project with us, *Fen*, penned by one of Britain's finest living playwrights, Caryl Churchill. And finally, we close with the premiere a new work by Victoria's own (and another UVic grad!) Janet Munsil. *That Elusive Spark* will surely continue the chain of engaging and thrilling new writing by this remarkable talent.

Maybe, like my grandmother, yours suggested the adage "Something old, something new, something borrowed, something blue" as the recipe for a successful marriage ceremony? I have since come to believe that this can also be used as the guiding principle behind the union of artistic aspiration and audience expectation in planning any season of plays. 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#### Joan MacLeod Playwright

Joan MacLeod is really happy to be back living in Victoria after graduating from UVic's Writing Department in 1978. Earlier this year she was appointed to the Department of Writing as an Assistant Professor. She will also work closely with the Department of Theatre on the upcoming Festival of Innovative and New Drama, particularly the staged readings which will be written by Writing students and directed and performed by Theatre students. Joan's plays include *The* 

Shape Of A Girl, 2000, Little Sister, The Hope Slide, Toronto, Mississippi and Jewel. She also wrote the libretto for The Secret Garden and has written several scripts for CBC Television. She has won several awards including the Governor General's Award for Drama (for Amigo's Blue Guitar), two Chalmers' Canadian Play Awards, the Jessie Richardson Award, Betty Mitchell Award and Dora Mavor Moore Award. For seven seasons she was a playwright-in-residence at Tarragon Theatre in Toronto. The Hope Slide was presented in Victoria this summer as part of the Fringe Festival. The Shape Of A Girl has been translated into six languages and has been touring since its premiere in 2001 including a stop this month at UVic's University Centre. This season it tours the U.S.A., starting with a run in New York City in January.

#### Playwright's Notes

When Brian Richmond asked what play of mine he thought might be suitable for university students I thought of *Amigo's Blue Guitar* right away because three of the parts are for young adults. I think they're challenging parts and so a good learning tool for students.

And then immediately I began to worry. Will the play seem dated? Central America is not nearly as much on the radar as it was when it opened in 1990. Now in part that's good -- today there is a fragile peace in much of Central America although it would be inaccurate to present that part of the world as untroubled. What does date this play is that when it opened there were fifteen million refugees world wide. I don't know what the number is now but I'm sure it's staggering and impossible to tally because we now live in a world where refugees are created every minute. We live in a world where danger doesn't feel far away anymore.

Finally we live in a world where mercy is needed more than ever. For me, that's what this play is about. I hope you enjoy it.

#### **IN MEMORIAM**

Last month, Canadian theatre lost two giants and UVic's Department of Theatre lost two friends. Ralph G. Allen, educator, theatre historian and co-creator of the Broadway hit musical *Sugar Babies*, passed away at age 70 in Manhatten. He was one of the first chairs of our theatre department from 1968 to 1972. Bill Glassco, founder of Toronto's Tarragon Theatre and a champion of Canadian drama, was a guest director with us in 1996 for Molière's *The Learned Ladies*. He was 69.



#### Linda Hardy Director

Linda Hardy is a senior faculty member in the performance division with many national and international credits to her name. She has recently returned from Bangkok, Thailand where she directed the premiere of Michel Tremblay's Les Belles Soeurs in Thai at Chulalongkorn University's prestigious Department of Drama. She is delighted to be back teaching her favourite courses and to be directing Amigo's Blue Guitar in honour of her new colleague in Writing, Joan MacLeod. She's also thrilled to be teaming up with Dave Conner and Fran Gebhard. It's terrific to have professional colleagues as mentors for the students.



#### Allan Stichbury Set and Lighting Designer

Allan Stichbury has been a faculty member in the Department of Theatre since 1989 teaching scenic design and lighting design. Recent set designs at the Phoenix include *Electra*, *Rodeo Star*, *The Taming of the Shrew*, *The Imaginary Invalid* and *Peer Gynt*. Allan is also active as a professional designer. Internationally he designed the Lighting for *Mr. Lincoln* on Broadway. Recent credits include *Blue/Orange* at the Belfry Theatre and Prairie Theatre Exchange, *Beauty Queen of Leenane* at Alberta Theatre Projects and *The Mystery of Edwin Drood* at the Shaw Festival. He has

exhibited his work, as part of Canada's National Exhibition, at both the 1995 and 1999 Prague Quadrennials and recently returned from the 2003 Quadrennial. He is the Past President of Associated Designers of Canada.



#### Nicole Lamb Costume Designer

Nicole Lamb is currently in her third year of the Theatre / Writing program at the University of Victoria. She has been involved with past productions at the Phoenix including: Fever and HE Who Gets Slapped as Assistant Stage Manager, the FIND Festival's Studio Series as Calling Stage Manager, Wanted as Assistant Costume Designer and The Resistible Rise of Arturo Ui as stage crew. She has been involved with many shows outside of the department including University of Victoria's production of The Vagina Monologues, Excedera and a number of productions back

in her hometown of Chilliwack. She looks forward to stage managing *Hippies* and *Bolsheviks* in the spring.





#### Yasmine Kandil Assistant Director

Yasmine graduated from the American University in Cairo with a Bachelor of Arts degree specializing in theatre directing in 1998. She co-founded an independent theatre troupe and trained on various improvisational techniques devised by French director Jean Michelle Bruyer. She has travelled to many European and Arab countries as the lighting designer for dance companies participating in various dance festivals. Three years ago she started working on a project to teach drama to street children and youth

garbage collectors in Cairo as part of a non-formal education project funded by UNESCO. This summer she continued to teach drama to under-privileged youth of the poor districts in Cairo. Yasmine is presently in the first year of her MFA degree in theatre directing at UVic. In the spring she will direct *Fen* by Caryl Churchill.



#### Gillian Reiss Stage Manager

Finishing up her final semester at UVic, Gillian's way to the light at the end of the tunnel has been paved with many wonderful Phoenix experiences. Selected credits include Assistant Stage Manager for 2003's *Listen to the Wind* and Stage Manager for last season's *Electra*. Out of department work includes Apprentice Stage Manager on *Proof* and *I Love You, You're Perfect, Now Change*, both at the Belfry Theatre, as well as a summer in Banff as an Assistant Stage Manager for Festival Dance, a highlight of which included D.A. Hoskin's ballet *Configurations of the Body*. Gillian

hopes to spend her post-graduation months earning her remaining Canadian Actors' Equity apprenticeship credits.

#### The Sheryl Fjellgaard Bursary (commencing in 2004)



#### David Conner Owen

David Conner was born in London, Ontario, studied acting in Montreal and has performed in theatres from St. John's to Victoria. Among his favourite parts are the title roles in *Uncle Vanya* and *Ivanov*, Lyman in *Bus Stop*, Cassius in *Julius Caesar*, Bottom in *A Midsummer Night's Dream*, Bernie in *Sexual Perversity in Chicago*, Ray in *Lone Star* and Colby in a Canadian tour of *Love is Strange*. Oddly enough, in a career that includes almost fifty stage roles, *Amigo's Blue Guitar* marks the first time he has ever played a dad.

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
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#### Phoenix Phacts
